In September the artist collective who made them, **Stereohell**, <u>revealed</u> that they hadn't actually plastered obscene posters on city walls they'd just Photoshopped their work onto pictures of various street scenes. And now the prank has come full circle: American Apparel <u>has collected</u> Stereohell's images into a real ad —that is, an ad genuinely intended to promote their clothing—on the back cover of November's *Vice* magazine. Isn't the hipster circle of life a beautiful thing?

- 1. Around New York, some porny, guerilla American Apparel ads (some NSFW illustrations) appeared on city walls and spread like wildfire.
- Right, those weren't actually *physically* on the walls. They were <u>AA ads</u> <u>photoshopped onto the walls</u> by the artist collective <u>Stereohell</u> (warning: short auto-play audio).

- 4. Open to cool ideas and willing to work with people to make cool stuff? Yes, American Apparel, you are. You took the original spoof ads and made them into a <u>real ad on the back cover of Vice magazine</u>. Fits like a glove.

Reading about this story is like watching cool happen.

Over the past year, a crop of advertisements for American Apparel began popping up all over New York City. Red and white line art drawings that seemed base and lewd beyond even our advertising standards. It wasn't long before these guerilla ads began garnering media coverage, and people came asking us who was responsible. But we had no idea. We did a little digging and found Stereohell, but that just seemed to confuse us even more. How many of these were there? Who was doing them? A man? A woman? A group? Did they hate us? Did they love us? Did they actually exist at all? It's been a while since we befriended Stereohell and we can honestly say we still have just as many questions as we did when the ads first appeared. Whatever the true story is, this represents some of our favorite selections from Stereohell's virtual illustration campaign.
